COLLABORATION AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT

The last year was a time of increased collaboration amongst the Auxiliary network, and more broadly with community fundraisers. United by a common goal to make sick kids better, these efforts ensured that urgently needed funds were pooled for ongoing project commitments at the RCH and important COVID-19 initiatives.

Auxiliaries support Me and UooUoo

Auxiliaries and friends rallied together to support Me and UooUoo: The RCH150 Anniversary Art Trail, selling beautiful keepsakes for adventurers to remember the art trail and raise funds for the hospital.

Kay Reay from **Parkville Auxiliary** and her sewing group handmade 150 unique UooUoo toys which were sold alongside Maxwell & Williams UooUoo mug sets at the Me and UooUoo farewell event at Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre on Saturday 17 April 2021.

Manning the stall were Parkville Auxiliary members Kay Reay, Jenny Holmes, Helen Mann, Bev Noonan OAM, Jan Gilbertson, Paula Brophy and Barb Nicoll from Templestowe Auxiliary. The UooUoo stall was popular with visitors, with all products selling out in three hours, **raising** \$6,817 to support patient care at the RCH.

Auxiliaries fund Solid Tumour Study Coordinator

CIKA and Absent Friends Auxiliary collaborated to continue CIKA's funding of the Solid Tumour Study Coordinator. The role is an integral part of the Children's Cancer Centre and provides patients and families the option to access clinical trials. Therapeutic clinical trials are the cornerstone of modern cancer care for children. With the support of CIKA and Absent Friends Auxiliary, children with cancer will have access to new treatments and novel drugs at the forefront of medical research.

The collaboration was featured on the front page of the Hamilton Spectator newspaper in July 2020.





Grateful patient family supports Beyond Sight Auxiliary

A grateful patient family has raised funds to support Beyond Sight Auxiliary. Marcus and Cass Hooke are the parents of three year old Jack who was diagnosed with retinoblastoma, a rare form of childhood cancer which effects the eye.

The family from rural NSW packed up and moved to Melbourne – four and a half hours from their home – in order to receive the very best treatment and care from staff in the RCH's Oncology and Ophthalmology departments. Over 10 months, Jack underwent multiple rounds of chemotherapy to try to fight off the cancer, but ultimately his right eye had to be removed. Thanks to the RCH, Jack is now cancer-free with a new prosthetic eye.

To express gratitude to the hospital for saving their son's life, Marcus and Cass offered one of their best rams for a charity auction at the 2020 spring sales. The family were able to **raise \$2,700 for Beyond Sight Auxiliary**, so they can continue supporting the RCH Ophthalmology Department and raise awareness for retinoblastoma.

Auxiliaries fund the training coordinator in the Neurodevelopment and Disability Department

Waverley Auxiliary and South Western

Auxiliary collaborated to continue funding a training coordinator with a focus on disruptive disabled children. The training coordinator plays an important role in educating parents, carers and professionals who look after children with developmental disabilities, providing a bridge between the latest research and the best care. Thanks to this joint Auxiliary funding, the training coordinator will create learning tools on the

management of disruptive behaviours in children and young people with autism or an intellectual disability.

Through webinars, online and printed resources, the training coordinator will empower parents, carers and professionals on preventative approaches to disruptive behaviours, identifying early signs and effective interventions when they occur.

Auxiliary and community fundraiser support the Social Work Department COVID-19 Crisis Fund

The President's Fundraising Network and community fundraiser Terry Sefton from **Mullets** for the Kids have committed \$20,000 over two years to support the Social Work Department COVID-19 Crisis Fund.

The Social Work Department provides essential advocacy and support services across all areas of the RCH. Since the onset of COVID-19, the Social Work Department has seen a significant increase in referrals for families of children experiencing severe financial hardship. This includes unexpected job loss by one or both parents, inability to pay for basic needs such as food and housing costs, in addition to treatment related costs such as travel, prescriptions and equipment.

Thanks to the support of the President's Fundraising Network and Mullets for the Kids, parents facing financial hardship will be receiving financial assistance for practical needs. This will give families peace of mind to focus on their child and their care at the hospital. This is particularly important given the widely recognised impact of stress and mental health throughout the community due to COVID-19.



AUXILIARIES CONTINUE TO GO WIRTUAL

With challenges come new opportunities to change and innovate. Faced with the ongoing effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Auxiliaries have been undeterred in their support for sick children at the RCH, adapting and turning to digital means for fundraising which have resulted in incredible successes.

Auxiliaries Good Friday Appeal Online Fundraising Campaign

The 90th Good Friday Appeal was memorable for its historic milestone and staged return to its traditional fundraising events in a COVID-safe way. As Auxiliary fundraising continued to be impacted by the pandemic, an online donation campaign was developed by the RCH Foundation.

Utilising emails, SMS and social media, the campaign ran in the lead up to, and on Good Friday, reaching hundreds of thousands of community members across Victoria.

Featuring photos of RCH patients captured by the Herald Sun during the Good Friday Appeal, the campaign encouraged donations to help support Auxiliary fundraising and provide the best care for sick children and their families at the RCH.

An incredible **\$214,596 was raised** through the online campaign, helping to boost the overall tally for this year's Good Friday Appeal, **which totalled** a **remarkable \$17,122,879.**



Dame Elisabeth Murdoch Nursing Development Scholarship Virtual Fundraiser

The Dame Elisabeth Murdoch Nursing Development Scholarship is a prestigious scholarship supporting the advancement of nurses at the RCH and is the largest scholarship of its kind at the hospital.

Every year, RCH Auxiliaries and the community come together to support this scholarship through a fundraising luncheon. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the 2021 event went virtual, with a thought-provoking interactive webinar that celebrated this year's scholarship recipient Jenny O'Neill. Together with colleagues from the CBC, the audience was presented with a hypothetical hospital scenario, and talked through the tangible impacts that Jenny's work, supported by the scholarship, will achieve.

Donations were encouraged both in the lead up to, and during the virtual event. On the day, 80 guests logged in, a number of whom had organised their own luncheons and were viewing in groups. This wonderful scholarship was also made possible thanks to the event's Principal Partner, BankVic.

Overall, **\$68,836 was raised** to help ensure nurses at the RCH will have the opportunity to excel and advance the care of patients through integrated research for many years to come.

Online Gratitude Hub

Face to face fundraising stalls and events have been unable to continue during the pandemic. In response, the RCH Foundation in collaboration with the AEC worked to develop new ways to support the Auxiliaries to fundraise. The outcome was the creation of a new fundraising and shopping destination, the Online Gratitude Hub. Since its inception in August 2020, the Online Gratitude Hub has been a successful online platform selling Auxiliary products to increase fundraising and reach new audiences.

Six Auxiliaries have been selling a range of curated products online, including kids' toys, clothing, kitchen accessories and blankets. From August 2020 to February 2021, **over \$12,130 has been raised** through the Online Gratitude Hub.

AFL Raffle goes online

Since 2001, Auxiliaries have held an AFL-themed raffle on Main Street to raise funds to support a number of projects across the hospital.

As Auxiliaries were unable to hold their usual in-person fundraiser due to COVID-19 restrictions, the raffle was held online between September and October 2020. The raffle featured a number of donated prizes including signed and framed prints of AFL stars Dustin Martin, Luke Hodge and Dyson Heppell, a Carlton Football Club guernsey signed by the 2019 playing squad, Sherrin footballs and more.

The online raffle was promoted across the RCH Foundation's social media channels, hospital internal staff website and through Auxiliary networks. Overall, **567 tickets were sold** and **\$2,171 raised** to support patient care at the hospital.





ADVANCING KNOWLEDGE OF

CEREBRAL PALSY

Despite cerebral palsy being the most common physical disability in childhood, there is still so much that is unknown about the condition. What are the causes? What treatments are best? What are the optimal ways to support children to ensure the best quality of life? Luckily, thanks to support from the Trailblazers and Special Kids EBC Auxiliaries, children and their families are benefiting from a longitudinal study of this condition.

Cerebral palsy is a physical disability that affects movement and posture as a result of a number of different types of maldevelopment or injury to the brain that occur early in life. Disability can range from mild to severe.

"Through an internationally renowned study at the RCH, the Victorian Cerebral Palsy Register Project is advancing our knowledge and providing better help and support for everyone living with cerebral palsy, their families and the communities in which they live," said RCH paediatrician Prof Dinah Reddihough AO.

Established by Dinah in 1987, the Victorian Cerebral Palsy Register Project collects information on people with cerebral palsy, born or living in Victoria since 1970. With 6,200 people registered, this important project is one of the largest of its kind in the world.

By collecting information about Victorians with cerebral palsy including demographic information, birth details, known or apparent causes, type and severity of the cerebral palsy and any associated impairments, researchers at the RCH and campus partner the Murdoch Children's Research Institute can monitor trends in the number of new cases of cerebral palsy over time in Victoria. This is important as it allows them to identify factors that appear to increase or reduce the risk of cerebral palsy. The register also allows researchers to undertake large trials and research projects to

investigate the effectiveness of various treatments and understand how children with cerebral palsy change as they get older.

"The register underpins everything that we do. It's the backbone of our research and has allowed us to undertake over a hundred extremely important projects. It's satisfying to have established something that's very important in filling a gap in knowledge and having such an impact on so many children and families." said Dinah.

It's not an overstatement to say The Victorian Cerebral Palsy Register Project has changed the lives of hundreds of thousands of children with cerebral palsy, not just in Australia but right around the world.

As the register holds information on all children with cerebral palsy in Victoria, Project Manager Dr Sue Reid and the register team collaborated with the Orthopaedic Department to demonstrate the association between the severity of cerebral palsy and the risk of hip displacement which causes extreme pain.

This led a team from across the RCH and further afield to develop 'Australasian Hip Surveillance

Guidelines' which have been implemented in many parts of the world. The guidelines provide information about the optimum frequency of X-rays to minimise painful hip displacement while at the same time, reducing unnecessary and potentially damaging radiation exposure.

The RCH team is now building an electronic platform to monitor hip displacement in all children with cerebral palsy across Victoria, so that measures can be put in place to detect the problem early and instigate preventive strategies.

"The register will play a role in ensuring that all children with cerebral palsy are monitored, and have the right X-rays at the right time, preventing terrible pain and loss of function in children when it is not picked up in a timely fashion," said Dinah.

Using the register, researchers investigated medication use in epilepsy, a condition which affects almost half of children with cerebral palsy. Until recently, it was thought that children would need to be on epilepsy medication for the rest of their lives. However, researchers found the prognosis is much better than they originally thought and many children can come off their epilepsy medication.

"A recent study of epilepsy has important, practical management implications. Contrary to previous views, we found the prognosis is much better than we thought and that epilepsy is likely to resolve in many children with cerebral palsy and anti-epilepsy medication should be used with caution and reassessed regularly," said Dinah.

While the register was established over 30 years ago and has been instrumental to the understanding of cerebral palsy and how best to treat patients, funding is always a major challenge.

"While everyone recognises how valuable registers are in advancing care and research for patients, obtaining funding can be difficult through grants and traditional channels," said Dinah.

"Words cannot express how grateful we are to the Trailblazers and Special Kids EBC Auxiliaries for the funding support. The only way we can really improve outcomes is to do high quality research and we know this register is vitally important and enormously helpful; and we are deeply thankful for the support," said Dinah.





MEET

Rose Pickard loves parties, a particular pastime we're all nostalgic for in 2021. Rose will be celebrating her 10th birthday soon, and mum Kate Breuer is determined to plan the perfect party - she's thinking roller skating!

Rose has severe cerebral palsy and relies on her wheelchair to get around, but despite not being able to walk and struggling with movement, she loves music, dancing, singing, and absolutely anything with colour.

"Last year we celebrated Rose's birthday with a joint disco party for Rose and a friend from school, and she loved the action," said Kate.

Roller skating might sound impossible for someone in a wheelchair, but Rose's family doesn't believe in impossible. They're committed to celebrating her 10th birthday in the most fun way possible.

"So, if we can get a carer to help push Rose around, I think she would really like roller skating, and being involved."

Rose was born early, at 25 weeks, after a challenging pregnancy for Kate.

"Rose was our first IVF attempt; I could get pregnant but couldn't stay pregnant, so when Rose was born at 25 weeks, it wasn't a huge shock for us," said Kate.

Rose spent her first 12 weeks of life in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) and a further 13 weeks in the special care nursery. She was diagnosed with cerebral palsy shortly after.

"The doctors had spoken to my husband Richard and I about Rose having a right-hand bias which is an indication of cerebral palsy, and then they did an MRI which confirmed the diagnosis," said Kate. "I went through a process of thinking, it'll be mild cerebral palsy, no, it'll be moderate – no its severe."

Rose requires a wheelchair and has significant challenges accomplishing daily activities. She has two carers who help Kate and Richard with meal times, changing and lifting Rose into the shower, or into her bed.

Kate and Richard are committed to giving Rose the best childhood possible, and whenever they can, they love to eat out as a family on weekends or get away on a family trip – their most recent being to Lakes Entrance with Kate's sister Astrid.

"We would love to do more, we go to cafes on weekends and when we get help and can get accessible accommodation, we go away, which Rose really loves," said Kate.

Rose attends appointments at the RCH three times a year with paediatrician Dr Monica Cooper, who is part of an expert team using world-leading practices to support children with cerebral palsy. Each visit, Rose is supported through a series of check-ups and specialised care appointments to support her development, including hip X-rays, kidney ultrasounds, and most recently, treatment for a dislocated shoulder. Eventually Rose will need to undergo surgery to help with movement of her limbs.

The Victorian Cerebral Palsy Register Project, supported by Trailblazers and Special Kids EBC Auxiliary, is helping to change outcomes for cerebral palsy patients, and is a project that the Pickard's are heavily invested in. Rose is enrolled as a patient, and Kate is also involved as a member of the Advisory Committee for the register, which discusses upcoming research projects and research findings.


"Rose has been involved with the register since shortly after birth and I've done a number of surveys for the register which look at things like optimal care, inclusion and Rose's experience either with cerebral palsy or the hospital," said Kate.

"I wanted to be a part of the register as research is so important and the work of the register is so vital. I am very happy to support their work however I can." The Victorian Cerebral Palsy Register Project collects information on people with cerebral palsy, born or living in Victoria since 1970. Researchers aim to identify factors that appear to increase or reduce the risk of cerebral palsy. The register also allows researchers to undertake large trials and research projects to investigate the effectiveness of various treatments and understand how children with cerebral palsy change as they get older.

Despite her physical limitations, Rose loves getting involved when she can and socialising.

"She enjoys school and chatting to people, within her limitations. Everybody who meets Rose thinks she's gorgeous and lovely. She makes you smile; she has a great sense of humour," said Kate.

"While she is behind her peers with learning and vocabulary, she is slowly improving. She will come out with a new sentence and she'll surprise us and I think 'wow', she'll do it slowly, in her own time."





X-RAY DOSE MONITORING TO KEEP KIDS SAFE

Amanda Perdomo checks on every single child that undergoes an X-ray, CT scan or other specialised medical imaging at the RCH. While most of these children and their families never even meet Amanda, she plays an essential role in their long-term health outcomes.

Amanda is the Radiation Safety Officer at the RCH, and oversees around 5,000 children each month. It's undoubtably a big job, but one that she says has been transformed thanks to the new MyXrayDose computer system which is currently being implemented across the hospital, thanks to the RCH Auxiliaries.

MyXrayDose is changing the way the RCH cares for patients, ensuring long term health outcomes. Medical imaging and scans are essential tools for diagnosing, measuring and managing a number of health conditions, however each scan exposes the patient to a small dose of radiation. For some children, their condition means that they need to undergo a large number of these scans in their lifetime, and luckily, thanks to this new technology, Amanda and her team have the ability to accurately measure their exposure to radiation, to ensure we manage and minimise their risk.

Nine Auxiliaries including the President's Fundraising Network, Kooyong Lawn Tennis Club, Broadmeadows, Parkville, Templestowe, Footscray and Yarraville Juniors, Geelong, Knox-Sherbrooke and the Southern Rainbows Auxiliaries funded the software as a gift of \$150,000 to honour 150 years of the hospital.

"It has been of great value to the Medical Imaging Department and the service we are now able to provide, and it wouldn't have been possible without the funding provided by the Auxiliaries," said Amanda.

Prior to this radiation tracking software, there was no central way of monitoring patients at the RCH and their lifetime burden from radiation exposure.

"It's much, much easier to monitor now. In the past, a radiographer would look at the scans and then contact me if there were any issues. The radiation information was recorded manually so there was more room for error or data loss," said Amanda.

The patient radiation and image quality monitoring software collates the radiation dose exposure for all patients and for every examination involving ionising radiation at the RCH. If any of the radiation exposures are outside of predetermined dose limits or the image isn't optimal, the software automatically sends an alert to Amanda for assessment.

"Although there are strict safety procedures implemented when patients undergo scans, they are still being exposed to a small dose of radiation. Excessive exposure can lead to a greater risk of developing cancer. Parents can understandably feel anxious about exposing their child to radiation," said Amanda.

"This system has immediate benefits for patients; the dose and image quality is being looked at for every single patient – I am overseeing everything in the background. Also, I now have the information at hand to show parents and ease their mind – I can communicate to them 'here is the last 1,000 children who had this exam' and being able to show the minimal radiation risk versus the risk of the patient not having that exam."

The system will also allow Amanda to identify any trends in increasing radiation dose or decreasing image quality over time.

"In the long term, once we get sufficient data, we can compare ourselves to international sites and see where we can potentially improve," said Amanda.

"We are so thankful to the Auxiliaries; this software has allowed us to deliver really great care to patients and has ensured we are able to go above and beyond. The RCH is the only Australian paediatric hospital that uses a comprehensive dose tracking software, meaning we are best practice and have the potential to be world leaders in this area."





SCHOLARSHIP EMPOWERS NURSES

TO MAKE ETHICAL DECISIONS

After years of study and specialised on the job training, nurses at the RCH are some of the most highly skilled in Australia. However one increasing area of need is navigating the complex ethical decisions that nurses face every day while caring for sick children and their families, often without a clear right or wrong answer.

With generous funding from the RCH Auxiliaries and their supporters including BankVic, the 2021 Dame Elisabeth Murdoch Nursing Development Scholarship will empower nurses across the RCH to make informed choices in challenging situations and bring a nursing perspective to clinical ethics.

Jenny O'Neill, the 2021 recipient of the scholarship is a multidisciplinary and highly skilled Nurse Consultant in the Nurse Research Department and has been caring for sick children at the RCH since 2000.

With the support of the scholarship, Jenny will develop her leadership in clinical ethics and pilot a program that aims to empower nurses across the hospital through education in clinical ethics. Working in conjunction with the CBC that provides support and advice to RCH staff for complex decision-making, Jenny aims to increase nurse participation in this process.

"Nurses face ethical dilemmas on a daily basis, with questions on the autonomy of children with disabilities, end of life care, families refusing medical advice and restraining children for procedures."

"Nurses have a really unique position at the patients' bedside in terms of advocating for the family and I want to optimise the nursing voice in difficult positions and discussions," said Jenny.

Part of the scholarship will fund Jenny's Masters studies in Bioethics, while the remainder will be used to set up the Clinical Ethics Nurse Liaison Pilot Program. Jenny was able to respond to the challenges of COVID-19 by adapting her scholarship project. Instead of international travel to learn from global leaders in nursing ethics, Jenny will be connecting online with children's hospitals in the United States of America to learn from global leaders in nursing ethics. She will draw on their resources to develop the tailored program for RCH nurses, which will be the first of its kind in Australia. Jenny's aim is that after the scholarship year, the program will become self-sustainable and run annually.

By educating nurses on the best way to work through difficult decisions, the program will not only help individual nurses, but the hospital as a whole. With her own further study on clinical ethics, Jenny hopes she can continue to work closely with CBC and aims to be a nursing leadership voice in clinical ethics.

"I've been at the RCH for quite a long time and I've watched a number of projects arise from the support of the RCH Foundation and the Auxiliaries. This scholarship is such a unique opportunity for nurses and I am so grateful for the support that the RCH Auxiliaries have given me," said Jenny.

THE HEALING POWER

OF MUSIC

Music has many benefits for our mind, but also our body. It has been proven to relieve pain, decrease anxiety and stress, reduce blood pressure and pulse rate, and release endorphins to improve mood and relaxation. It can also help with speech, memory, concentration and movement. At the RCH, the power of music is being harnessed to optimise patient care, recovery and assist rehabilitation of children and young people with brain injuries.

The RCH was the first Australian paediatric hospital to have its own music therapy program, and while other children's hospitals have since followed suit, the RCH is still the only one to have a specialised music therapist for neurosciences and rehabilitation patients. This is all thanks to philanthropy and the generosity of Knox-Sherbrooke, Parkville, Roxburgh Park and Pankina Auxiliaries and their supporters in 2020/2021.

Music therapy is a part of the Allied Health Department, with music therapists working alongside speech pathologists, physiotherapists and occupational therapists together with medical teams to address the functional goals identified by the child and their family.

Janeen Bower is one of eight highly trained music therapists at the hospital, working on maternity cover for the neurosciences and rehabilitation music therapist Jo Rimmer. In her role, Janeen is mainly working with children and young people with acquired brain injuries, focusing on early coma arousal and functional rehabilitation.

"Music is globally processed throughout the brain so it's different to language which is fairly lateralised to the left side of the brain. Music is processed throughout the left and right sides but also in the emotional centres of the brain, which makes it a powerful tool for holistic brain engagement," said Janeen.

While a child is in a coma, they are in a state of deep unconsciousness as their damaged brains attempt to recover. Despite being in a coma, research indicates that patients are still able to hear words and sounds, making music a powerful tool in the recovery process.

"Early coma arousal work is important as we know that the sooner a child responds to stimulation, the better it is for their recovery. Patients in a coma can respond to music in ways that they can't respond to other experiences in their environment at the time," said Janeen.

"We talk to the family about what music their child would like, then I play and sing to them with my acoustic guitar. It creates a personal connection with them, and I can adapt the music based on their response. This is not an instant process and can take many sessions. I have seen children who smile as they wake up from a coma listening to their favourite song."

For patients in the later stages of their recovery like Dashiell Gurung (who you can read about on page 30), Janeen focuses on reducing mood irritability after injury and practical rehabilitation.

"Our work is framed in the beautiful package of music which is both engaging and enjoyable for patients."

To help with speech articulation, Janeen works with patients to read lyrics and sing songs. In many cases, children can sing more words than they can speak. With a music room full of instruments, kids can choose to hit the drums, shake a maraca, stroke a guitar or play on the keyboard to help with impulse control and concentration.

Music therapy brings joy to patients as they connect to their sense of self, helping them cope with the stresses of the hospital experience and inadvertently assisting them with their physical rehabilitation requirements.

"To the Auxiliaries, your support ensures we have a dedicated therapist for some of the most critically injured patients. An enormous thank you from our team, the children and their families who benefit so much from music therapy."

MEET DASH

Metallica and ACDC isn't the typical music you'd hear coming from a patient's room at the RCH. But with Dashiell (Dash) Gurung, rocking out is all part of his recovery from a serious brain injury.

Music therapy for neurosciences and rehabilitation patients at the RCH is fully funded by philanthropy, with the support of the RCH Auxiliaries. The therapy not only assists with the functional goals of patients like mobility and communication, but it also gives them the opportunity for self-expression.

Parents Joanna and Dupendra Gurung are based in Albury, NSW on the border with Victoria with their sons Daniel, age 16 and Dash, age 11. They never imagined that their children would ever need the services of the RCH. However, everything changed on a fateful day in February 2021. Dash was at a friend's house where there was an accident and he sustained a severe head injury.

In a critical condition, Dash was flown to Melbourne in an emergency response helicopter and rushed straight into surgery for a craniotomy. This involved removing a section of skull bone to provide access to the brain.

Following surgery, Dash was taken to the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) and was placed in an induced coma as his brain recovered. Joanna and Dupendra spent 19 days by Dash's bedside until he finally woke up, however he was suffering from post-traumatic amnesia (PTA), meaning his memory had been affected.

When Dr Juliet Clayton, Dash's neurosurgeon, visited the family once he was conscious, she immediately recommended music therapy to help with his PTA. Joanna wasn't aware this type of therapy was offered at the hospital, but the family were on board to do anything they could to help Dash with his recovery.

"At the beginning when he wasn't fully cognisant, Jo
Rimmer, one of Dash's music
therapists, would sit and play
him soothing music and he'd
often fall asleep. Then after
six weeks he started to be
more aware so we pushed
for multiple sessions a week,"
said Joanna.

Music was a big part of Dash's life before the accident. With a passion for heavy metal bands like Metallica, Oasis and ACDC, Dash is an old school rocker at heart, just like his mum Joanna. At home, Dash would play guitar with his older brother Daniel, who is heavily involved in music and the school band which also influenced Dash's musical side.

For Dash's current music therapist Janeen Bower, music was all about reconnecting to his sense of self and helping achieve his functional goals of increased communication and mobility.

It was through music that Dash started to talk more and express himself after the injury. While playing 'Nothing Else Matters' by Metallica with therapist Jo, his voice came out and he started to sing more words than he was currently speaking at the time.

"Early on Jo used familiar music as a meaningful way to connect to Dash. We then started integrating singing and basic instrument playing as he improved. This helped with his speech articulation, breath control and concentration.

Our work is very child-focused, tapping into the strengths of the child to maximise them and align with the goals of the rehab team," said Janeen.

Through their music therapy sessions, music therapists Jo, Janeen and Lauren Khalil-Salib integrated structured activities like tapping on coloured drums and saying the colour, finishing sentences while singing and pattern repetition. There was also free music time, where Dash could take advantage of the music room at the hospital with a full range of instruments.

"Dash likes letting loose on the drum kit – it's a huge expression of emotion and energy as before he could walk, he couldn't do a lot actively so being able to smash it out on the drums was an awesome experience for him," said Joanna.

Dash's results have been incredible. After five months, Dash's speech has improved, he has recovered some of his memory and he can walk unassisted. Joanna and Dupendra now see music therapy as a vital part of Dash's hospital experience and recovery, and will be continuing music therapy once Dash gets back to Albury.

"We're incredibly thankful to the Auxiliaries for their fundraising to support music therapy. Just because the music is fun, it shouldn't be misunderstood as easy or soft as it has been instrumental in Dash starting to recover his expressive communication but also really good for his mental health, his creativity, and all those other cognitive skills, like planning and focus," said Joanna.

"I think it's super important for kids here, they get so much enjoyment out of it. But as well as enjoyment, they can make progress indirectly, it doesn't feel like they're doing therapy. You hear it in the ward when the music therapist is in the room, there's always laughter, the vibe feels really good."


